For example, if you ask a debt collector to avoid calling you at work, the FDCPA says that the debt collector must abide by your request. Debt collectors may not harass, oppress, or abuse any person. Debt collectors may not: (a) Falsely imply that they are an attorney or government representative. A debt collector may not contact you at inconvenient or unusual times or places, such as before 8 a.m.

After you receive the documents, you will need to look over everything very closely to be sure that they are not trying to tack on any unnecessary fees or other charges. Once you can afford to start paying it back, there are a few factors you should look into first. If you're in this situation, you may want to look into disputing the accounts that you question directly through the credit bureaus. Collectors do not have any right to discuss this with anyone else in detail unless they are co-signers of the account in question. Last but not least, start paying now and prevent problems later. That's where you will now send your cease and desist letter. However, they will first have to send you a warning letter to ask you to make payment to avoid court, normally in the form of a default notice. Debt collection agencies must follow the same rules as the original lender, which means they have the same legal rights. Yes. To exercise this right, you must send a letter to the collector stating that you do not want the collector to contact you again. The notice must tell you how much money you owe, who the original creditor is and what to do if you don't think you owe the money. It's important to be skeptical when someone contacts you and wants money. It's a debt collection agency's duty to offer you additional support, if necessary, to help you pay back the balance owed comfortably. If they insist that the debt is indeed owed by you, ask them to send proof by way of the original agreement. They'll likely phone you after writing to you, so you'll have the opportunity to explain your situation and work something out with them - and it's important to remember not to let them pressure you.

If the debt collector wins the lawsuit, the court will place a judgment against you, basically acknowledging that you have a legal obligation to pay back the debt. I fully understand, my husband had collections hounding us multiple times a day. I'm Charlie with Acme Collections calling again about your delinquent credit card account with XYZ Bank. We have advised them we are identity theft victims and to cease all communication, except through the mail and they keep calling several times per day.

Even a spouse's obligation to pay may be limited under state probate law. If a consumer believes FDCPA or state laws are being violated, they should file a complaint with the Justice Department of the State Attorney General's Office. If you also believe that your debt collector violated the terms of FDCPA then you also have the right to file a lawsuit. If your financial situation leads you to file for bankruptcy, the law assumes you're trying to pay your debts. Some individuals pay debts they do not owe just to get debt buyers to stop calling, or to ensure that the debt does not wrongfully end up on their credit report. And that's where it gets scary because I can go online if I want to track down this mythical Bob Smith and I can go to this site, that site, the other site, Google searches and whatever. John Harrison lives in Michigan, you pull up all the John Harrison's in Michigan, you pick the one in Dearborn, you click on it, and it shows you a Google street view of his house, the average market value of the houses in that area. But if you go into that, you can look up people in the U.S and it gathers census data, social media data, Google street view data and literally you can type in John Harrison. I've come back, none of the collection agencies can find me. So, it could be that I've been off the radar for three or four years, I've now come back; maybe I was out of the province, the country or whatever. I go and I apply for this credit card and bam within two weeks I've got 17 phone calls from all the people who are trying to track me down.

We're not sure if the defendants will claim certain documents do not exist, when they do. For example, in a Colorado product liability lawsuit filed by a man whose young daughter was killed in a 4Runner rollover crash, Toyota withheld documents about internal roof strength tests despite a federal judge's order that such information be produced, according to court records. Harassment: Collection professionals may not make repetitive calls or ones that are intended to annoy or abuse the person answering the phone. You should also keep records of the time and content of phone calls. If the phone rings - and you have legitimately incurred a debt - you are responsible for paying it. If you're receiving calls from a debt collector, you can request that they stop contacting you and they're required by law to honor that request. If you're dealing with debt collectors, you only need to request that they stop. I would not send payment without a written outline in hand that clearly spells out what it is that you and the debt collector have agreed to. The letter must be sent within 30 days after you receive the validation notice from the debt collector. You should always communicate with debt collectors in writing by certified mail and you should always keep the receipt and a copy of the letter. I received a letter dated (date on the letter) from you demanding payment of the above debt. In fact, sending a "do not call" letter to a debt collector may cause a debt collector to sue you sooner than it otherwise might have.
